Chairman's Comments - Roy Denney

With winter behind us we can now enjoy running without our thermals and anticipate the prospect of sunning ourselves after an event in some convivial beer garden (drinking soft drinks if that is your wont).

I do feel it essential to foster the camaraderie that comes of socialising after events. Not only does this give the opportunity for debriefing and autopsies which should actually help prevention of similar mistakes being made, but it does create the sense of 'club' from which helpers and officials are generated.

We need to learn to work together better as the sport is being ruined by constant bickering and complaining at all levels. At the end of the day we are a sport that depends on large numbers of volunteers and if we keep chasing them away by complaining when standards fall short of perfection we will eventually have no sport.

Everyone from car parking attendants to BOF Councillors get abuse fairly regularly and it continues despite it being highlighted from time to time. We all need to realise that sometimes a bad run is our own fault and not the planner, controller or mapper.

Disputes and disagreements will arise from time to time but they should not become personal and should be resolved

in private. Clubs are struggling, regions are disbanding and BOF vacancies are cropping up and whilst there are a number of reasons for such occurrences a large contributory factor is often the break down of team spirit.

Andrew Kelly is giving up his role as Development Officer and Roger Smith is leaving the Start programme. Simon Errington has given up the Chairmanship of Events Standards, Peter Guilliame from Competitions and Eric Peckitt as leader of the map group.

We are again approaching the time when our minds must turn to the formalities of AGMs and elections. This will be my last as your Chairman as I will have completed by term of office at that meeting.

Whilst on such matters you may have noticed that Yorkshire & Humberside Region have elected to switch to being an association of clubs rather than having individual orienteers as members which is you may recall what was suggested for EMOA last year. Their view is that runners feel they are members of clubs and that it is the clubs which need to be members of an association to facilitate the running of the sport in their location. NWOA are also structured that way and whilst there is no requirement that all regions run in the same fashion it does seem to be the way things are going.

One of the comments attributed to the YHOA Chairman is that they were lucky to get ten members to an AGM on the old basis. We do a little better than that but not greatly. No doubt this subject will raise it's head again but by then I will not be sitting in this chair.

Our own AGM is arranged for Monday October 6th at Kegworth if I do not get time off for good behaviour.

Turning to day 2 of JK 2004 a controller has finally been appointed but a safety officer is still being sought.

The day one assembly and start has been moved away from the event base to take pressure off it and will now be in Middle Dale. This leaves us with Graythwaite as used previously for the British, and our biggest concern for this location is road traffic management and how near to assembly, starts can be arranged. What ever our best efforts the local police will no doubt have a say.

Chris Philips will need about 100 volunteers to stage 'our day' so if you are hoping to go please speak to your clubs to see how you can assist.

Apart from the fact that a budget has still to be agreed things are now starting to take shape.

We are also now approaching one of the most dangerous times of the year as far as I am concerned.

I will be lucky to get away without a damaged hand as I go into the presentations season. By the time you read this I hope I will have

congratulated you for winning your class at Belvoir in the East Midlands Championships on this extended and improved area. If not better luck next year. Similarly I will be doing my duty at Chatsworth for the Midlands Champs and I trust you will support this event.

Not to be outdone the EMOA Gallopen presentations will be at the Aylestone Riverside C4. This may not be a classic area but as the thickets and wooded patches have reached maturity it is quite easy for experienced competitors to take it for granted and make bad mistakes and if you go along you should get a good run. It was good to be able to include a RAFO event in the programme this year.

Another event for your summer diary is the annual National Forest Trophy event, this year being held at Grange Wood (Between I bst ock and Battram and not to be confused with other blocks of woodland bearing the same name) This C4 is being held on a completely new area which has been developed over the last five years. This is an area of about 400 acres with good relief and trees maturing nicely in parts whilst other bits are still immature. With three stream systems running through the area there will be a surprising amount of up hill and down dale for a Leicestershire area. You may recall that the landowner hired a JCB for two days which we then spent digging pits and building knolls to create spot features.

The actual trophy is awarded to the competitor excelling in their class by the biggest margin as assessed by a small jury and whenever possible is decided and presented on the day. This does mean that it is possible for any age class to win it which is in line with the original concept when the trophy was endowed to support the 'all the family' aspect of the sport.

There are unlikely to be as many entrants this year compared to last year's winter event at The Outwoods where well over 250 took part. This included 5 under five and 6 over seventy

including one past 75 and still going strong, which reinforced the claim to be a sport for all ages.

Since the National Forest Trophy was donated in 1998 the event has been held at five different venues within the Forest and Grange will make the sixth. The first was at Beacon Hill and it has also visited Rough Park at Lount, Calke Park by the Abbey and Bagworth Woodlands.

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Control Congestion

Electronic punching has now become the norm at East Midlands colour-coded events. But we seem to have taken a retrograde step in organising the start. In the past runners were allocated times at registration and then went off at one minute or longer intervals. The start official would alter start times within reason for people who were late arriving so long as there was a gap on their course. Now we seem to have settled on allocating times, perhaps by self-service and then ignoring them at the start so that it descends into chaos.

We seem to have tried a lot of alternatives with e-punching but haven't settled on a good system. The fact that your race time only starts from punching the start box has encouraged start officials and competitors to believe runners can start whenever there is a map free. On the other hand the master maps have become more complicated to mark up as planners have taken advantage of e-punching to avoid 2nd master maps on the longer courses. We have tried not allocating start times and queuing at the start to go at minute intervals or when there is a map free but competitors object to a long queue in cold weather; you can't even go and warm up because you lose your place.

So a few pleas to planners and start officials. Plenty of master maps, 5 are needed on a popular, complex course to ensure there are enough for one competitor per minute to mark up, of her wise insist on regist ration only allocating alternate minutes. And leave space on the boards for the competitor's map. And spread them out so there is room at each board. Competitors should still start on the minute at minute intervals to enforce separation. If I mark up quickly and gain on the person in front that's up to me, but I object to going through the start 5 seconds behind the 2 previous competitors just because 3 maps became free at the same time and then running the whole course with someone else. If start times have been allocated then stick to them, calling people through because there is a gap or a map free only leads to mistakes. Something else that is being forgotten is that the check of e-cards is vital and should be done by the start official not left to the competitor's whim. The clear boxes should be where all competitors have to pass them on the way to the start and they need a reminder notice on them to warn competitors that they should hold their e-card in until it bleeps and this will take up to 15 seconds. The check is to ensure that card has been cleared properly. If it hasn't then at the very least there will be a problem at download.

The ideal solution seems to be to not allocate start times at all but the most popular events. Then queue at the start in lanes for each colour in order to go through on the minute. So long as the start is ready to go early to pre-empt any queues and there are enough maps so there is always a map free or at the very least room around them, I think this would cope for nearly all E.M. events. With this system fewer helpers are needed on regist ration and

We could of course go over to pre-printed courses at colour-coded events but that's another story!

Junior Badge Events.

The basic problem is that youngsters develop at different speeds and at the same age can be young children or virtual adults and setting courses to challenge the latter will deter the former.

Most of my friends think that course lengths are the only basic problem and that this could be easily rectified. The new ageless classes might work given time but we cannot see how this differs from offering colour coded courses at badge events for those novices not yet ready for proper classes.

It occurs to me that we should forget ages completely and go for the BC system of courses.

As at bouncy cast les we should have a height bar at pre start and competitors should be given a course appropriate for their leg length.

To assist you in assessing how this would work I have put together an indicative chart:-

The Harvester Trophy

The Harvester Trophy Relays, Britain's answer to the Tio Mila and Jukkola, is unique in the British orient eering calendar in requiring much larger teams than at JK and BOC and taking place overnight with several legs in the dark. This year they are being staged by DVO on the National Trust's Longshaw Estate south west of Sheffield on the weekend of 14th/15th June. For those who remember the bracken from the Junior Inter Regional Championships a few years ago some words of reassurance. We are not using the worst affected area below the quarries at the north west corner of the map; the National Trust have been spraying the bracken in recent years with noticeable effect and this event is three weeks earlier in the year.

Dave Peel's revised map is ready for printing. Steve Kimberley is well on with planning the courses. Mick Lucking of NOC who controlled the Junior Inter-Regional is controlling again. Michael Napier and his superb computer system have been booked for the night. Wilf's have said they are coming if enough teams enter. Moreover, assembly and camping is behind a pub that also serves meals.

There are seven trophies in all so there is plenty of opportunity to match your club's strengths. Three of the trophies are for the 7 lap A course and four for the 5 lap B course. On the A course there is the original Harvester open trophy, the Handicap trophy and the Sutton Park Trophy for clubs that have not been in the top 3 teams for the previous 5 years. On the B course there is the Panasonic Trophy for the first all women team, the Devilla handicap trophy, the Star Posts Trophy for a women's handicap team and the Happy Harvester Trophy for the best junior team. Combined teams from adjacent clubs agreed with Event Standards Committee are eligible for the open trophies.

The last 5 year rule for the Sutton Park trophy means the first 3 teams in 1997, BAOC, BOK and EPOC all come back into contention for that trophy. In fact the only clubs barred from winning it are Interlopers, South Yorkshire, Sheffield University and Claro.

Due to the rearrangement of fixtures following Foot and Mouth the event is just a month and only a few miles south of BOC 03 and this year's British Relays. This does mean that there is a concentrated period for 3 of the events in the UK Relay League with the Scottish Relays between these two but then that is what the event guidelines suggest for the Harvester.

The Harvester Trophy - A Retrospective

As Mike has said, the Harvester Trophy is due to take place in EMOA in June. When DVO host the event on Longshaw Estate on June 14th/ 15th it is in many ways going home.

The first Harvester Trophy took place only a few miles away in Ecclesall Woods on the South side of Sheffield on 9th July 1978. The introduction of the event by the Combined Harvesters club, hence the name, was an attempt to provide Britain with an event similar to the Scandinavian multi-leg night relays. As someone who took part in that first event I remember the shock of the large floodlights and marquee at an orient eering event. And yes, the trophy is a Combined Harvester on a plaque.

The event seemed to go well and was very competitive. Ecclesall's fast runnable woodland seemed designed for night orient eering. However, people soon were coming back after the first leg with comments such as "Almost impossible without a lot of luck" or "Controls at least 150m from any attack point" yet the leaders were back from the 6km in 63 minutes with SLOW and AIRE just 6 seconds apart. The 2 teams continued to battle it out with the lead changing hands throughout with SLOW eventually winning the 7 leg relay in 7hrs 30m for 42km, 10 minutes ahead of AIRE, with BAOC 3rd. Although many night runners came to grief due to lack of batteries there was overall enthusiasm for the event. The plan was to take in South for the next year.

A year later 96 runners started from the Rushmoor Arena as a rocket lit the sky. It was a well organised event with the varied terrain of Caesar's Camp proving perfect for night orient eering. This event saw the introduction of the Handicap Trophy, which allowed those clubs without 7 superfit M21s to compete (though at this stage they ran the same courses. London OK also fielded the first all female team to compete. As I set out in 11th place, shortly after dawn, for DVO on the 7th leg I was looking for ward to a top 10 finish. I passed 2 runners before leaving the arena and was going well. Unfortunately it was not to be. The third control had gone missing and many of us milled around before deciding to complete the courses. The results were eventually declared to stand at the end of the 6th leg. This time, on the ranges, it was the army that came out top.

1980 saw the trophy move back north to Lyme Park with again 90+ teams starting the event. The park provided a natural arena in which to compete. However, the gap bet ween 1st and 6th team was almost an hour. 1981 was again down to the Aldershot area for Ash Ranges with SLOW being the first team to win the trophy twice. 1982 saw the event move north to the Catterick moors and saw the introduction of the "B" course, so that not all competitors were completing the same long courses. There was also a Swedish team competing, who would have finished 3rd but their last leg runner mis-punched. However, Arsunda were back the next year at Longmoor to win the trophy. There was also the introduction of both the "B" course and the handicap. However, shortly after the event CompassSport carried an editorial – "Don't Let the Harvester Die!". Combined Harvesters was a small club and the event took a tremendous amount of effort to organise. It was proving too much for the club and now members felt "the idea now fills them with dread". The organisers appealed for another club to take over and run the event. But would the Harvester Trophy survive?

Well it did. Mytchett Common though provided one of the toughest events (bracken growth was high, hiding controls) and after 4½ hours only a handful of teams had competed 2 legs, so many night legs became dawn. Controversy followed as EUOC survived double disqualification. Their 2nd leg runner was originally disqualified for indistinct punching, then re-instated, then on the last leg their runner short cut the route from changeover to the start triangle. The controller disqualified the team, but as Arsunda did not want to win on a technicality they asked for the students to be reinstated. Eventually they were. There was also the first runners to complete all 7 legs with two of them attempting the feat, and Andy Lewsley winning the battle (leading the "B" race for 6 legs).

EBOR volunt eered to stage the event in 1985 after it looked like it would not take place. It took place in Pickering Forest, but the weather gods were not kind with rain and thick mist making the event very difficult. I endeared myself to my DVO colleagues by running the first leg and retiring. It was some of the toughest orient eering I had ever performed and I found at one point I had climbed half way up a crag and couldn't work out how to get up or down. Discretion took the better part of valour, I retired handing over to Steve Kimberley, not telling him I was retiring. What I hadn't realised is that everyone was having maj or problems and it seemed like I had come in well placed! I vowed not to do night orient eering again that night! Steve vowed to throttle me as he spent the next 2 hours trying to complete a similar course to me and not let the team down – he found he had managed to run up a fallen tree and ended up 10 feet off the ground!

Next year I was back to run the long night leg for DVO at Sutton Park. However, due to the late start at 1am I was able to complete most of my leg in dawn light. The event was again a great success. The following year the event moved to South Wales and the wooded sand dunes of Pembrey, technical in the daytime, very complex at night.

And so to the East Midlands. NOC host ed the event in Clumber Park in July 1988 and were rewarded with a record entry of around 110 teams. By now the majority of the teams competed in the handicap class with around 20 teams competing in the open cat egory. The Ladies competition had become a success with now 12 teams competing, including one from DVO who finished 5th. I remember enjoying running a long night leg in Clumber for a DVO handicap team (much more enjoyable than Pickering).

1989 saw the event in the New Forest with the innovation of a "C" class, (were the course fracturing too much?) but the distances appeared to have prevented many northern clubs from competing. The event continued to move round the fringes of Britain for the next few years, the Lake District, Guildford and Scotland. Teams were down for these years. However, in 1993 the event returned to it's original home of Ecclesall Woods. The event though still had a low turn out with just 7 teams competing in the "A" class. However, the following year 117 teams entered, as the event took place in Bracknell, numbers not seen since Clumber Park. A year later around 90 teams

competed near Ludlow, but there seemed to be a migration towards the "C" class with only 10 teams on "A", 43 on "B" and 41 on the "C".

1996 saw a revamp of the format of the Harvester as the event moved to Hexham. It encour aged 20 teams to compete on the "A" class and saw the introduction of a shorter 5-lap women's race. However only 280 competitors took part, compared to 660 at Brampt on Bryan. Further tinkering with the format in 1997 saw the event move back to Longmoor, but this time 100 teams entered (teams of 7 in the A class, an teams of 5 in the B and C classes. Many clubs have invented their own trophies which go with the Harvester. NOC have a special trophy of an alarm clock which went to a member who slept in and missed his run!

Below I have provided the first 3 finishers in the Open Harvester class. There have been various of her classes introduced over the last 20+ years. I nitially the Handicap Trophy started as part of the main event, based on runners scoring a certain number of points based on age classes. I nitially this was won by Walton Chasers (79), Reading (80) and SYO (81). The Handicap then moved to the "B" class. It seems to moved around more clubs than the Open trophy, with at least 12 different winners, though SLOW seem to be the experts having won it at least 4 times. Other innovations have been the Ladies trophy which started in 1987. SYO dominated this between 1993 and 1998 winning 4 times in this period. However, East Midlands is able to claim one regular trophy winning team, NOC are the experts at winning the Junior trophy which started in 1998. From the results I was able to obtain, I'm not sure if they have ever been beat en!

Historical jottings

We have from time to time mused on the histories of some of our areas. We have learned about the origins of various names throughout our region and have traced Martinshaw Woods back to the Doomsday Book. I am sure our editor would be glad of other similar contributions to make 'your' magazine more interesting.

Having just spent two Sundays in March with assemblies of old Lincolnshire runways there must be a lot of tales which could be told about these areas.

Temple Wood at the beginning of the month was a bit of a shock. To see row upon row of parked and rusting old military vehicles left to waste away on the old runways was something of a an eyesore and I would be at a loss as to how to show them on an O map. Erik Peckett opted out and just ignored them as they were only on the assembly area and not strictly in the event area. Perhaps a man made embankment?

The adjoining woodlands were surprisingly rich in wildlife (unfortunately not least the brambles) but the old runways, derelict equipment and the sound of the local clay shooters banging away did conjure up images of yesteryear. The story of this former airdrome and missile site would make interesting reading.

Later in March saw us running at Twyford Woods just a few miles down the road and another former air base. A delayed start and glorious weather gave more opportunity than is usual to take in the surroundings. I saw a couple of brimstone butterflies and started a number of roe deer out of thickets and primroses were scattered about the area.

These neglected air bases are surprisingly helpful to wildlife. No one has bothered to tidy them up and the rough unimproved grass surrounds often kept low by grazing sheep has preserved a wildflower rich pasture.

In addition the runways themselves create warm sunny 'glades' on which butterflies and insects thrive which support the food chain.

Twyford is apparently a good location for wild basil and green-winged orchids and carpets of wild strawberries providing food in particular for the now fairly rare grizzled skipper butterfly's caterpillars.

Those few of us who repaired to the local inn after the event heard some of the history but much more must be out there. One interesting side story we heard from an informed resident was of the local character who went into a crop field to retrieve a pheasant he had downed only to swap jackets with the scarecrow he came upon.

Another large area of great interest has recently been the subject of a detailed report. This enormous estate which is about the size of the Isle of Wight is a swathe of chalk grassland smothered with native wildflowers. The owners have a resident archaeologist as the area is completely covered with clear remains of Romano-British and Celtic settlements and field systems which can be clearly seen from air surveys and much evidence is turned up on the ground.

5000 years of history is evident with Bronze Age barrows, Iron Age hill forts and a Roman village. English Heritage is publishing a book after a 10 year study which should make fascinating reading.

Unfortunately you are unlikely to have any opportunity to visit this fascinating area as it is the army training area on Salisbury Plain. The plus side is that despite the surprisingly small impact the shelling and tank activity have the very presence of the army and the thousands of unexploded munitions mean man's normal developments will be unable to spoil the area.

Things aint wot they used to be!

With the supposedly worst of the year behind us we should be able to look forward to better weather but a traditional quietening of our sporting calendar.

You are aware that in two year time BOF has agreed to carry out a comprehensive review of the way we organise events but I would advocate that we need to take this further and include consideration of when we stage them.

In the past our woodlands were at their best during late autumn, winter and early spring when bracken, bramble and other nasties were down and the new year's crop not yet stirring.

Climate warming has made a nonsense of this, particularly in the lowland areas of the country. Wetter winters make many areas virtual swamps for much of the winter, bramble never seems to die down and the benefits of this time of the year seem to have largely vanished.

This year January was the warmest and sunniest for 40 years and flowers (and undergrowth) normally seen in March or even April were blooming all over Britain. My lawn only stopped growing for 5 weeks this winter. We had over 100 hours of sun during February this year and March was the driest and sunniest for two decades. On the day

of the Twyford event the highest temperature recorded in Britain was 21 degrees and those running there were very much in need of the refreshments available at the finish.

It is hard to say now, when winter actually starts and what constitutes winter. October 2001 was the warmest ever recorded although also one of the wettest. November 30th that year was the hottest temperature ever recorded on that day and that December was one of the sunniest on record.

For historic and traditional reasons we have a surfeit of major events in the spring often leading to clashes at lower levels and yet we have limited competition later in the year.

Classic events in high country can still enjoy these months of the year but given the conditions underfoot are little different throughout the year a case can be made for spreading badge and colour coded events more evenly through the year. This would involve changing such as the galoppen into an annual league but would avoid the congestion in fixtures we see at present.

Numbers may suffer a little due to holiday commitments but as car parking is one of the major problems facing the sport we may have to come to accept smaller events.

New map production techniques mean that print runs do not need high attendances to cover costs and summer badge events would open up areas closed to us during much of the winter because of shooting rights.

Many clubs enjoy summer evening leagues showing that areas are perfectly usable at that time and perhaps more use should be made of f summer weekends.

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Editorial

Well the orienteering season now seems to be in full flow. We've had the badge events of NOC and LEI and hopefully this EMEWS is available for collection at the DVO Chatsworth event. So I thought I'd ask a couple of questions that have come up recently:

- 1) There is concern in some quarters that colour coded certificates are much harder for girls / ladies to get than for men. Should we award separate colour coded times for girls / ladies? I've heard quite strong views both for and against this proposal. What are your views?
- 2) After 15 years of marriage I've finally got my wife, Cathy, orienteering. She has attended 2 events, Blidworth and Belvoir, both in glorious sunshine. She now thinks all orienteering is held in sunlit forests. However, because of this I've been looking at orienteering from the beginners view point. At Blidworth, there was

also a CompassSport Cup competition going on. Those competitors had pre-marked maps, but ran the same courses as those who entered on the day. However, the results didn't differentiate between the two — so those competitors who spent time marking up their maps couldn't see their time relative to the other colour coded competitors. 
