Chairman's Comments - Roy Denney

I trust you will forgive me for indulging myself whilst I have the opportunity but I have persuaded Mike to include in this edition, a poem 'what I wrote' about orient eering. Apologies to long standing members of LEI who may recall seeing it before.

Turning to JK 2004 things move on at an increasing pace.

Roger Edwards is pursuing several points on the budgeting arrangements between the various parties involved but the event itself is now moving along nicely.



I myself have met with the Chair of NWOA and I have also visited the event area and met with Sue Denmark the overall co-ordinator and can confirm it is an attractive, interesting area (and very challenging) and should be an excellent event.

As far as the organising side of day 2 is concerned all the major organisation blocks are in place. Chris is now fine tuning his preparations and is currently discussing with the planners the logistics of the day bearing in mind their course requirements. Chris is firming up his arrangements and will be looking for commitments from his promised helpers. He now knows enough about the central arrangements to start a dialogue with your club chairs about allocating duties.

I have in the past mentioned the various ideas for streamlining the management of the sport and making BOF a more effective management. I deas are now

settling down and BOF Council have agreed in principle various changes to this end which will be detailed at the AGM for those able to get there and will be finally decided on at the end of this year.

The gist however is that where at present 6 committees report to council this will be reduced to just one: the Management Committee. This effectively be the executive of BOF pr oviding t he core day day to management supported by the paid Wit hin of ficials. t he management committee their will be a sub group responsible for development and development should feature in the considerations of all committees they will probably each be involved in this sub group in some way.

It is proposed that we should then have just 3 committees and each should be supported by one of the professional staff and should report to the management committee.

One would be Coaching, another International and International Events and the third an Events Operations Committee. This last will be supported by 6 steering groups or subcommittees.

BOF Chair and Vice Chairs will almost certainly chair the committees which will have specialist members rather than representatives from all the associations. Democracy will still prevail by representation on full council where the ultimate power lies but the working

committees should be leaner and more effective.

Some committees and certainly Event Operations will have 'correspondent members' i.e. a representative of each association who will receive all committee papers for comment and may request or be invited to attend meetings when appropriate.

Event operation will be supported by the following sub groups:- Elite competitions, Senior Competitions, Junior competition, Rules, Fixtures and Mapping.

In the past there has been a conflict of interest between Events Standards and Competitions and bringing these roles together within one committee should resolve this.

One of the first major tasks to be tackled under the new structure will be the simplification of the events programme

One of the first major tasks to be tackled under the new structure will be simplif ication of t he event s programme. Many clubs and groups of orient eers have been discussing this for months now as it becomes apparent that the increasing demands for competitive events and technological advancements conflicting wit h decr easing ar e resources available to deliver these demands.

Clubs and individuals are invited to discuss any suggestions and feed them

either to their associations or direct to David Morgan, BOF Vice Chairman, via BOF office.

Do we have too many major events tying up too much of the calendar? Do we need so many age related events with their multiplicity of courses? Should the 100 mile rule be relaxed to permit more badge standard events to take place at the same time with smaller numbers and therefore less parking difficulty?

We have changed the juniors away from age related and much of the world does not age relate many events. Should only Championships be on an age basis? Possibly National Events should as well but what about badge events?

BOF have already agreed that a C4 need only have yellow, orange, green and blue – perhaps in future a C3 should be an extended colour coded with a full range of courses (white to black with possibly a red)

Please make your views known.

Another issue on which your views are welcome is that of the women's colour coded badge times. Should they have their own standards? - at present some find it hard to achieve their standards because they are in with the men for results at events.

Historical jottings

We have from time to time mused on the histories of some of our areas. We have learned about the origins of various names throughout our region and have traced Martinshaw Woods back to the Doomsday Book. I am sure our editor would be glad of other similar contributions to make 'your' magazine more interesting.

Having just spent two Sundays in March with assemblies of old Lincolnshire runways there must be a lot of tales which could be told about these areas.



Temple Wood at the beginning of the month was a bit of a shock. To see row upon row of parked and rusting old military vehicles left to waste away on the old runways was something of a an eyesore and I would be at a loss as to how to show them on an O map. Erik Peckett opted out and just ignored them as they were only on the assembly area and not strictly in the event area. Perhaps a man made embankment?

The adjoining woodlands were surprisingly rich in wildlife (unfortunately not least the

brambles) but the old runways, derelict equipment and the sound of the local clay shooters banging away did conjure up images of yesteryear. The story of this former airdrome and missile site would make interesting reading.

Later in March saw us running at Twyford Woods just a few miles down the road and another former air base. A delayed start and glorious weather gave more opportunity than is usual to take in the surroundings. I saw a couple of brimstone butterflies and started a number of roe deer out of thickets and primroses were scattered about the area.

These neglected air bases are surprisingly helpful to wildlife. No one has bothered to tidy them up and the rough unimproved grass surrounds often kept low by grazing sheep has preserved a wildflower rich pasture.

In addition the runways themselves create warm sunny 'glades' on which butterflies and insects thrive which support the food chain.

Twyford is apparently a good location for wild basil and green-winged orchids and carpets of wild strawberries providing food in particular for the now fairly rare grizzled skipper butterfly's caterpillars.

Those few of us who repaired to the local inn after the event heard some of the history but much more must be out there. One interesting side story we heard from an informed resident was of the local character who went into a crop field to retrieve a pheasant he had downed only to swap jackets with the scarecrow he came upon.

Another large area of great interest has recently been the subject of a detailed report. This enormous estate which is about the size of the Isle of Wight is a swathe of

chalk grassland smothered with native wildflowers. The owners have a resident archaeologist as the area is completely covered with clear remains of Romano-British and Celtic settlements and field systems which can be clearly seen from air surveys and much evidence is turned up on the ground.

5000 years of history is evident with Bronze Age barrows, Iron Age hill forts and a Roman village. English Heritage is publishing a book after a 10 year study which should make fascinating reading.

Unfortunately you are unlikely to have any opportunity to visit this fascinating area as it is the army training area on Salisbury Plain. The plus side is that despite the surprisingly small impact the shelling and tank activity have the very presence of the army and the thousands of unexploded munitions mean man's normal developments will be unable to spoil the area.



Mike Rowbottom: Government cuts will force even orienteering to lose its way

The following article appeared in the Independent Sports section on 24 May 2003

I'll be honest - I don't know much about orient eering. It has always struck me as an excruciating paradox in that it requires thinking and running at the same time - maths on the move. As I recall from my Scouting days as a member of Squirrel Patrol, map reading is a difficult enough activity when you are static, especially if your patrol leader insists on folding the map into a thick wodge of paper and keeps on jogging you just as you've got the compass steady.

No wonder we always came last in the out-and-about exercises. Marching to our leader's favoured slogan of the time - "We shall fight, we shall win, Ho, Ho, Ho Chi Minh'' - didn't appear to have any mitigating effect upon our incompetence.

But I digress.

Although orient eering is not something close to my heart, I can understand its potential satisf actions as a test of mind and body. And it requires little more than a compass, a map and a stretch of God's earth, preferably wooded.

Healthy. Cheap. Educational. Sounds just like the kind of thing the Government wants to see more of as it promotes its latest policy document on delivering - love that word - sport to the nation. This report, known as Game Plan, was presented by the Sports Minister, Richard Caborn, this week to the annual conference of the Central Council for Physical Recreation. It boils down to three main wishes, as the Minister himself expressed them: "Participation, participation, participation.'

Caborn's performance, not withst anding his daring pink tie, was that of a man waiting impatiently for a train. Which indeed he was. And the need to be away in time to meet that train meant he was only able to address a couple of questions from the assembled representatives of the nation's sporting bodies before he made his exit.

But at least this gathering of dedicated sports administrators had the benefit of some invaluable insights into their chosen area of expertise. The Government, it turns out, is committed to sport. So too is the Prime Minister. And sport, it transpires, is vital to improving the health and economic vitality of our country.

There isn't enough space here to do full justice to the Minister's speech. Suffice it to say that his listeners were so dazed with its wealth of information that they almost forgot to clap when he had finished.

Among those left with their arms in the air at the end of "question time" was Robin Field, the chief executive of the British Orient eering Federation.

Like many others in the theatrically lit auditorium at Heythrop Park near Oxford, Field was experiencing a sense of imminent ruin. As the sale of Lottery tickets continues to fall, the Government has made no secret of its plans to concentrate resources on "mainstream" sports. Officials at Sport England are currently steeling themselves to tell all but around 20 of the 64 sports currently receiving Lottery funding that the support will end next year. Those at UK Sport, which supports the élite end of sports, are having to make similarly painful calculations.

Field does not kid himself that orient eering will be up there with cycling, swimming and at hletics when it comes to the great divide. His beloved organisation thus stands to lose more than half its income.

The question he wanted to put to the Minister was this: if the British Orienteering Federation [with an estimated 100,000 active participants] modernised and jumped through every hoop required, could it avoid the unkindest cut? In his heart, however, Field knows the answer.

Of course it may be that he, along with so many others, has missed the point in the Government's current drive for participation. Caborn reminded the conference that over the last seven years around $\mathfrak L$ 1.5 billion has been put into sport via Sport England, and while this has transformed facilities it has increased participation by just 0.7 percent, a situation that the Minister deems "unacceptable''.

So the new policy appears to be this. Having apparently failed to stimulate sporting participation through funding, the Government is now embracing the bold option of stimulating participation by not funding.

You have to say, that is out-of-the-box thinking. And who knows? It might work. But Field is not alone in doubting it.

"We have four part-time schools development of ficers," he said. "We could do with 20. But how can you expect to increase participation if you are not going to provide the seed money required to encourage it? The Government agencies, Sport England and UK Sport, are having to make the Judgement of Solomon. They are having to rob Peter to pay Paul."

Caborn concluded his remarks to the conference by emphasising the watchwords that now apply to those in charge of sport's governing bodies - "delivery, efficiency, transparency and account ability.'' And, in Field's case, impossibility.

Summer is upon us and that means that we don't have so many Sunday orienteering events to attend, but there are still plenty of local club evening sessions. These are normally fun local events, so don't be afraid to turn up.
