MINUTES OF THE 39th ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING OF THE EAST MIDLANDS ORIENTEERING ASSOCIATION HELD ON MONDAY OCTOBER 6 2003 AT THE RED LION, KEGWORTH

3. Chairman's Report

This is my last report as your Chairman and I would like to start by thanking all the officers and members of committee who have assisted me in the three years I have served as your Chairman. I trust you will all agree that it has been a harmonious and constructive period which has not always been the case elsewhere in the sport.

I would also like to thank John Woodall, my predecessor. As accommodated for in our constitution he remained on committee for one year after handing over, but did continue to attend many meetings in subsequent years and the hot-off-the-press knowledge he brought to the table by virtue of his role as Chairman of BOF was most useful. He was often there when I sought advice but never pressed his views on me and left me to plough my own furrow. Similarly I welcomed the support of my Vice Chairman, Ranald McDonald, who as a BOF Councillor also brought us up-to-date detail of developments within the sport.

Given how invaluable this has been I have suggested that any member of EMOA who achieves the position of elected BOF Councillor or Chair or Vice Chair should during their period in those positions be ex-officio members of the EMOA Executive Committee to provide similar support to my successor and the new committee. Unfortunately my suggested amendment to the constitution seems to have been corrupted in transmission and I will be offering a slight amendment to it.

John himself has now relinquished BOF office but in recognition of his service to the sport and to retain the benefit of his experience I have proposed him for President of EMOA.

Electronic punching has become widespread and is a great improvement for competitors but it does put extra strain on event official in particular planners and the clubs need to address this point.

We held a very useful event officials conference during this year giving those of us who attended a very comprehensive breakdown of the new BOF rules and developing guidelines. There were however a lot of long standing grade 3 controllers who did not attend and I can only hope that they have studied the new rules, to get up to speed on the new regime. Unfortunately there are still fairly regular situations locally where courses do not comply, leading to gripes in the car parks.

As I and many others have said before we need to learn to work together better as the sport is being bedevilled by people moaning at what they see as the imperfections of others who are all at the end of the day volunteers.

I would like to congratulate all winners in our championships and those who did well in the Gallopen. Both the East Midlands and Midlands Championships were on our patch and seemed to go down well and we had 13 diverse events in the Gallopen. It was nice to see RAFO providing one. Running from October to early May as it does, with enough foresight we should be able to get in the equivalent of 2 each month and I trust we will see another interesting programme this year.

We still have a vacancy for a development officer and I would put this down as the biggest failure of the Association during my tenure. We may come out of next years JK with some surplus and traditionally such funds have been used for development and it could provide a good opportunity for anyone interested in having a go at this role.

On the subject of the JK things seem to be moving along well but we will need to provide considerable manpower on the day.

This year has seen the introduction of the new badge scheme for the juniors and BOF have instigated a comprehensive review of how the other events in the programme should be run and we may have time to bounce ideas around at the end of the formal meeting.

Once again many thanks to everyone who helped make my task relatively straightforward and good luck to my successor.

Thanks were given to Dave Walker for his work in "independently financially examining" the Association's books. The final accounts for the year were circulated and accepted.

EMOA Committee Meeting Report - December 1st 2003

This column is going to be a regular part of EMEWS and it's intention is to provide a direct conduit from the EMOA committee to you. Items in here will be those mentioned at the EMOA committee meeting that might be of interest to the members.

Return of EMOA Champs Trophies – Anyone who has a trophy from last year needs to return it to Keith Roberts ready for this years EMOA champs at Sherwood Forest in January. Keith can be contacted on 01773 570016.

DVO Grant application - EMOA agreed to support an application from DVO to the BOF development fund for support of a programme with schools orient eering.

Plaid Coalville – The application by Plaid Coalville to be a BOF affiliated club has been withdrawn as they have been set up as a group affiliated to LEI.

CLUBMARK – BOF, in association with Sport England, has developed a club accreditation scheme called CLUBMARK. This provides for those clubs which are working with young people to have their good practice recognised with a Clubmark Award. More details are available with club secretaries.

BOF EGM – At the EGM it was agreed to accept the British Schools Orienteering Association (BSOA) as the 13th BOF association.

The BOF EGM discussed how to get the AGM quorate. How can we encourage more people to turn up? Any ideas would be gratefully received. This 2004 AGM will be held in association with the JK in the Lakes.

There was also discussion about the validity, or not, of separate BOF championships (i.e. splitting out the junior from the senior). Any comments would be gratefully received.

World Cup event 2005 – It looks likely that a World Cup event will be held in the south of England in 2005.

Streamlining Organisation – The new BOF organisation structure is taking shape and should provide more direct accountabilities. The basic structure has been approved by Council, though some further work is still required which should be back to Council in January.

Independents at events—It is now possible for independents (i.e. not affiliated to BOF) to enter regional events. The recommendation is that if they do so it should be at a surcharge of £3 to encourage them to join BOF.

M/W80 - For BOC and JK in 2004 there is to be a new age class - M/W80 - who will run the same course as M/W75S.

Dibbing correctly – There will be a short piece written for inclusion in the next 'Focus' re it being the competitors responsibility to ensure that they punch/dib correctly. This follows some high profile cases where there had been problems.

Event Nomenclature – There has been a decision to change from the traditional names of events to Regional, District and Local events. You will see this in the Fixtures list. However, it has been agreed that there can be a compromise if people felt appropriate, e.g. Regional Badge Event, District Colour Coded Event, Local Limited Colour Coded Event, etc.

Dogs at events—The current statement on this is "The default rule is 'no dogs' unless the Organiser, who should make the effort to do so at all times, has agreed with the Landowner(s) exactly what can and cannot be told to competitors in pre-event details about dogs at the event".

Galoppen – At the AGM it was proposed to make it a January to December timeframe. The EMOA committee agreed that this seemed to be a good idea and felt that this should take place from 2005 onwards. It may be appropriate to start some events in Autumn 2004, but will discuss once we see the full fixture list. So after this current galoppen the next will finish around end of 2005. On the topic, what should we call it? Is galoppen too grand a name? Does anyone know how to spell it? Should we really call it simply League? Please let me know your views.

Mid-week Events – These were discussed at the AGM as well, but it was felt appropriate to ask clubs to consider whether they could do this. It may be a good idea, but it will be dependent on club manpower, etc.

Under- 21 Badge Scheme – The Under 21 badge scheme is now underway. Rules were in previous EMEWS.

JK2004 - Message for Helpers

Helpers should enter as normal. They will receive start times but they will receive nearer the event date a helper start permit which will allow them to start at what ever is convenient to their job. When they start it will be a punching start for them which will override their allotted time.

JUNIOR TRAINING AT LAKESIDE

A watery sun was shining on the heather-covered knoll high up on the Lake District fell. The view was magnificent looking down over cloud filled valleys when suddenly a great cheer rang out from those standing on the knoll. The orienteers just finishing the second line course of the morning looked up inquisitively. It was nearly 11 am on Saturday, 22 November and Johnny Wilkinson had just kicked the winning drop goal in the Rugby World Cup.

Ten M and W16s in the East Midlands Junior Squad had travelled up to the YMCA Lakeside Centre the previous evening to join 50 M and W16s from the other regional squads for a coaching weekend.

Most of Saturday was spent in some of the more complex parts of High Dam followed by a 13 control, 1.9 km sprint race in the wooded grounds of the YMCA centre. Richard Robinson was one of the EMOA coaches present and he maintained the credibility of the adults by getting round in 12 minutes just beating all the juniors although Andrew Llewellyn was only 25 seconds behind.

Following tea, and England's success down under, an imprompt u game of touch rugby started. This came to a rapid halt after a vicious attack on Rhys Roberts by a metal post holding up a roof extension. This seemed particularly unsporting as, being Welsh, Rhys was not quite as ecstatic as the others and also he did not have the ball when he was tackled. As Rhys went off to Barrow hospital, where a broken collar bone was diagnosed, the rest of us gathered for a talk by W2003 World Championships team member, Heather Monro.

Heat her, who won the women's super elite class at this year's Swedish O-Ringen, was among a number of BOF stars who were present and she gave an interesting talk on why you no longer need to live in Scandinavia to reach the top in orient eering.

Next morning most of us went to Haverthwaite for more training. This technical area was the venue for the 2003 British Elite short race and was an excellent place for our route choice and control picking exercises. An even greater challenge was presented with a course on a contour-only map which our M/W16s seemed to cope with very well. Unlike the East Midlands it was dry, sunny and warm for most of the day which enabled all our juniors to spend valuable time practising techniques on difficult terrain.

Sunday afternoon was spent travelling down a very busy M6 before heading for home to try and find a video recording of the rugby match.

All of us would like to wish Rhys a speedy recovery and to thank EMOA for their support for this valuable coaching weekend.

A Brief History of Orienteering

Orient eering began in the forests of Scandinavia, where it was introduced as a form of army training. The word 'orient eering' was used in military circles to mean "crossing unknown territory with the aid of a map and compass" as early as 1886, and by 1895 orient eering competitions were being held between military garrisons in what was then the United Kingdom of Sweden and Norway. Strong links remain between the military and orient eering in many parts of the world, and Hitler banned the sport in occupied Norway because orient eers with detailed terrain knowledge were of great help to resist ance groups.

Interestingly, the word 'orient eering' appears to have been registered (as a trade name) in Canada and the USA around the same period. It is also known that 'compass and map' races were held in British army sports events in the early year of the 20th century. However, the origins of orient eering as a sport are generally recognised to be Scandinavian.

The first public orient eering competition was held by the Tjalve Sports Club near Oslo in Norway on October 31st 1897, making 1997 the sport's cent enary year. The course of 19.5km with three control points in wilderness terrain was won in 1 hour, 47 minutes and 7 seconds. A similar competition organised in 1901 near Stockholm in Sweden by the

Sundbyberg Club had six entries for a 14km course with four control points, and the winner took 1 hour, 35 minutes and 34 seconds.

It is believed that in 1899 the first public ski-orient eering event took place.

But modern orient eering racing did not begin until 1918. Maj or Ernst Killander, President of the Stockholm Amateur Athletic Association, was concerned at the declining interest of youngsters in track and field athletics and decided to use the natural environment of Sweden for a new type of running activity. He devised a cross-country competition where runners not only ran a course but had to choose their own routes using a map and compass. Orient eering on the Killander model demanded strength, stamina, running ability, mental agility, and the application of navigational skills in challenging terrain. It proved a great success from the start and the first event on March 25th, 1918, received a lot of press publicity. 220 runners competed over a 12 km course with three control points, with the winner taking 1.25.39. Killander went on to lay down all the basic principles of competitive orient eering, including rules, types of courses, choice of control sites, age groups and organisation. He is rightly recognised as the "Father of Orient eering."

The sport proved to be attractive to a wide range of people and quickly spread throughout Sweden in the 1920's. The first night orient eering event was held near Stockholm in December 1922, and Sweden also held the first regional championships in 1923. The first ladies event was held in Got henburg in 1925. The Swedish elit e championships started in 1926, and in 1927 a District Relay Championship was organised in Uppsala. Eric Tobe, a member of the winning team, went on to become the first President of the International Orient eering Federation when it was set up in 1961.

The first international match was held near Oslo, with Sweden defeating Norway in 1932.

The maps used by these early orienteers were neither detailed nor accurate. They were black and white - sometimes with blue for water features - usually at a scale of 1:100,000 with hashure lines rather than contours to indicate height. Specialist full-colour orienteering maps were not produced until 1952, and compasses were either the conventional 'watch' type or wooden box compasses until the development of the Silva protractor compass in 1933. This was developed by the Kjellstrom brothers, Bjorn and Alvan, and their friend, Brunnar Tillander. They were among the best Swedish orienteers of the thirties, with several individual championships among them.

By 1934 orient eering had spread to Switzerland, Hungary and the USSR. The first orient eering event in North America took place ion November 10th, 1941. The first nucleus for international co-operation was the Nordic Committee for Orient eering set up in 1946, and in May 1949 the Swedish Orient eering Association held an international conference in Sandviken in which 11 nations took part. The first events were held in Australia in 1955.

An open international competition held outside Stockholm in 1960 attracted seven nations, and was followed in 1961 by the inauguration of the International Orienteering Federation (I OF) at a meeting in Copenhagen. There were ten founder members: Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, East Germany, Finland, Hungary, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland and West Germany.

The first European Championships were held at Löten in Norway in 1962, with Magne Lyst ad, a forestry worker from the host country, as men's champion, and Ulla Lindquist from Sweden the women's champion. In Finland in 1966 this event became the World Championships, with Ulla Lindquist again women's champion, and the men's champion again a Norwegian, Age Hadler.

You've Been Quangoed

There are literally tens of thousands of quangos and these unelected bodies control most aspects of our lives in one way or another. These quasi autonomous non governmental organisations have powers and budgets delegated to them and get involved in all sectors of public life. There is no specific definition and I have been unable to find any list of them but I no longer feel left out as I have joined an advisory group set up by the local authority on instructions from the Government.

There are certainly too many of them and they have overlapping responsibilities making it very difficult for people to know who they have to consult whenever they wish to start any project.

A classic example is the way of life in the countryside and the sporting and environmental considerations impacting on everything which takes place there.

Lord Chris Haskins has been appointed the Government adviser on rural affairs and has just issued a report on the delivery of rural services. I had the opportunity to listen to him and have a brief chat when I attended his presentation of the awards to successful tender schemes for the National Forest recently. He brings a commercial view to the situation having retired in 2002 as Chairman of Northern Foods having been with them for 40 years and this is generally welcome.

He has confirmed what we all know -i.e. that the Stakeholder (to use the in jargon) does not know who to turn to in the plethora of responsible bodies and the major thrust of his suggestions is to do away with many including English Nature.

I have had my difficulties with English Nature in the past when trying to get access to woodlands but this is a fairly drastic step. English Nature is one of the biggest quangos and its biggest problem is that it is a mixed bag of specialities and they do not all speak with one mind.

Haskins recommends creating a super quango replacing numerous existing ones having an impact on rural matters but whilst this is ideal in theory it would probably be even more riddled with inconsistencies as none of these bodies ever impresses with focused management structures. It would cut down on the number of agencies and the required reports to them and the form filling that drives so many people daft but the downsides are numerous.

Such bodies could be said to include non profit making companies (Railtrack) and other companies where the government is the shareholder (Post Office) and also trusts like the National Trust.

Government always has a major influence either by virtue of its right of appointment or by dint of the funds it provides and one argument is that these are really government functions and should be carried out by our elected and supposedly accountable government.

We all saw however what problems there were with the late and unlamented MAFF where the consumer's protection and farmers interests were seen to be in conflict. I need not highlight the farce of Foot and Mouth.

DeFRA (Dept of Food and Rural Affairs) has replaced it but is largely comprised of the same people with a different label.

They have set up a further quango in the Food Standards Agency but there are disputes as to how independent this body is.

English Nature (EN) has been reasonably independent of the government's line, in particular in regard to GM crops, and wildlife would lose a champion if it was only one consideration of this proposed super quango.

If EN is to resist this pressure to be absorbed it needs to get its own house in order. My contacts with it suggest that at national level it has many good aspirations but locally it is served by many traditionalists with narrow views leading to the apparent obstructiveness which thwarts farmers, landowners and land users such as ourselves.

At a recent meeting under the auspices of the Central Council for Physical Recreation (CCPR) a senior representative of EN explained their position on access to the countryside and on recreation and nature conservation and confirmed that they welcome action to improve access to the countryside. They want people to experience and benefit from contact with nature and recognise that recreation plays an important part in improving people's quality of life and sense of well being. They advocate an environmentally sustainable approach which enhances both wildlife and recreation which must surely be in everyone's interest and particularly ours.

EN nationally has a close working relationship with many sporting interests, including anglers, canoeists, climbers, cavers and orienteers. They have in fact sponsored BOF's Environment Practice booklet. They did conceive however that there is a problem, because whilst at a national level there is an overall integration of sport and nature conservation, at a local level there are difficulties. Certainly not all SSSIs or other protected areas are suitable for all or any types of recreation, nor at all times of year.

There are many people with concerns where they have been unable to get what they seek on a particular site. Further, as CCPR acknowledges, not all forms of recreation are compatible amongst themselves. The CCPR is of course yet another quango.

There is an argument that agriculture and environmental concerns are now of one mind since farmer support is now being directed at grants for sustainable development and environmental protection rather than production grants which is something I have been advocating for years. However, increasing amounts of land dedicated to wildlife and / or sporting use are not pastoral or arable land and could lose out in this equation.

The wilder parts of Britain which we enjoy have thriving wildlife populations which are best left in natural balance without bureaucratic control which if well intentioned, is often misguided or plain stupid.

I recently sought access for a small area which we had used informally for years only to find that it had been fenced off to protect rare lichens which only thrive there because footfall has kept other wild plants at bay. We started mapping a superb potential orient eering area capable of staging badge events and near to Fineshade only for EN to designate it a National Nature Reserve and withdraw their agreement. This was despite the support of the District Manager of the landowners, The Forestry Commission (a quango).

One of my favourite areas consisting of eroding sand cliffs, brackish coastal marshes, sandy heaths and stony scrapes is known as the Brecklands, and is home to many rare species of flora and fauna which has survived largely due to the careful activities of local people.

Bodies like the RSPB have been actively involved but landowners have shown unusually sensitive attitudes to the needs of many creatures and the success of these partnerships should be an example to all. You are however unlikely to see it replicated elsewhere as EN has stepped in with heavy boots.

Farmers who made a success of these voluntary schemes have been rewarded by the imposition of a statutory reserve status on them (SSSI) which means in many aspects of their activities they cannot carry out there normal functions without the permission of EN.

The justification for this action (which they say they have to carry out under EU rules) is that this area of about 30,000 acres is home to 40% of the national population of stone curlews. This bird, whilst still threatened, has doubled in number over the last ten years and there are now over 400 thought to reside in Britain. It has managed this without statutory protection.

The ludicrousness of this action is even more apparent when you realise that farmers are now going to be paid compensation for leaving areas of bare earth for the birds to breed and for management they are already doing volunt arily.

EN does have legal responsibilities to protect areas but a bit more common sense in interpreting these matters would not go amiss. In my experience, EN in some localities seems to see no good in any of man's activities.

No matter what its aims, if it continues to make it difficult for voters to enjoy what they are preserving, then eventually the political support for their existence may well dry up.

Having no illusions about the need for EN to improve, I do not favour one monstrous quango as despite what anyone might say this would be even closer to DeFRA and more susceptible to political pressure.

Even government has no clear demarcation lines as much of what goes on in the countryside comes under the Office of the Deputy Prime Minister rather than the Department of Food and Rural Affairs.

My own experience of DeFRA leaves me with little comfort. In my own role as Chairman of the Leicestershire Local Access Forum I recently attended the National Access Forum.

This was set up at DeFRA's behest by the Countryside Agency (another giant quango with a big hand on rural matters) as part of the roll out of the government's flagship CRoW legislation (Countryside & Rights of Way Act).

It brings together representatives of numerous organisations (many of them quangos) to advise DeFRA and other authorities on the progress and implementation of this act. At the last meeting DeFRA could not even find a representative to attend.

Sport England and the Lotteries Board (both quangos) have a role to play and there is, as I see it, a need for a wildlife advisory body able to advise all government departments, local government and other authorities, but all need to be sensitive to each others concerns.

One mega grouping would just become an arm of government and perhaps the best way forward would be an umbrella group where the senior players in each organisation could get together regularly to compare notes. Unfortunately this would need a secretariat and would itself become yet another quango.

Fixtures

This fixture list is intended to list all major events in the UK, and all East Midlands events. It includes all the information available to me about the event at the time of going to press. Unless otherwise stated, District events offer entry on the day (EOD) to a range of colour coded (C4) course with start times from 10:30 to 12:30. Local events (C5) will only have a limited range of courses. Regional and National events (C3 & C2) provide a range of age related courses and are normally entered in advance using a Standard Entry Form (SEF); entry on the day (EOD) will usually be limited and more expensive. Most will offer a limited number of colour-coded courses for EOD. Cheques payable to organising clubs given at beginning of details, if not specified.
