EMOA Committee Meeting Report - September 26th 2005

E-mail Links to Officers – Andy Portsmouth has updated the EMOA web site so that officers can be contacted without their names being made available on the site. Go to the www.emoa.co.uk and select Contact EMOA Officers.

New Vice- Chairman and Treasurer Required – A new vice-chairman and a new treasurer are required for EMOA. Please consider volunt eering as we need someone in these roles as soon as possible. Contact a member of the EMOA Committee if interested.

Coaching – The 2006 Coaching Conference is to be held at Lilleshall 13-15th January. If you are interested in coaching you should consider attending. Clubs are encouraged to support the conference and provide funding for their coaches (or potential coaches) to attend. The theme this year is Player Pathway – the right coach in the right place at the right time.

BOC 2009 – LEI's proposal to use Belvoir and Grace Dieu was discussed. It was agreed to get a grade 1 controller to review the area and assess it's suitability. Meanwhile all clubs were asked if they had any suitable areas so this could be discussed at the next committee meeting.

Grants for Juniors – A number of EMOA juniors had been selected for tours and had applied for grants. These grants were approved with the proviso that they produce an article for EMEWS.

Junior Inter-Regional Championships – The Junior Inter-Regionals had been a great success, particularly with the help of the Manor School which provided excellent facilities. It had been agreed that these facilities were provided at a low cost so that any profits went back into the Nottingham Schools Partnership for the development of orient eering.

Part Time Coach for DVO – This is still progressing though very slowly.

BOF Revised Membership Proposals - The EGM discussed the revised membership proposals and 2 further alternatives were submitted. After discussion of the proposals an indicative vote resulted in the BOF proposal and one of the submissions having a similar number of votes. Further discussion meant that everyone agreed that it should be possible to take the 2 proposals and merge them in to one going forward. There was almost unanimous agreement that all orienteers should be members of the British Orienteering Federation (be it as a full or an associate member) —this is probably the first time recently that this has happened. The proposal will be developed further and submitted to the next BOF AGM.

BOF EGM – Following an amendment new membership f ees were agreed. The BOF f ees will be £ 26 (Family), £ 18 (Senior), £ 3.50 (Junior), £ 15 (Associate member), £ 30

(Clubs). There will be a £ 1 reduction if paid by direct debit. It was also agreed that event levies should rise by 10%.

2 other proposals were also carried.

BOF Vice Chairman Resigns – Ranald MacDonald has resigned as BOF Vice Chairman. EMOA would like to thank Ranald for the enormous amount of work that he has put in during his time as Vice Chairman and previously in moving the membership proposals forward.

Map Group – Any club that wants to put on a mapping training course should involve the Mapping Group (they may be able to provide assistance).

Standard specifications for all school maps are close to being finalised.

National Forest – Audrey Brown who works for the National Forest is moving on. She has been a great supporter of orient eering in the National Forest and will be missed.

Purchase of SI Equipment – Derek Gale detailed the purchase of new SI equipment. This would allow 3 sets of master stations for small events and 2 x 70 controls to be circulated rather than just one set as now. EMOA would also purchase the new lighter stakes to assist planners. The meeting agreed to these proposals.

AGM – We need to try and get out more publicity about the AGM prior to the meeting. That way we can avoid being inquorate in future.

Junior Selections – 2 EMOA juniors, Andy Llewellyn and Rose Hodkinson have been selected for the Junior European Cup taking place in Austria.

NUOC website – NUOC now has a website. A link will be provided from the EMOA website.

Next Committee meeting—the next EMOA committee meeting will be held on November 21st following the reconvened AGM.

Orienteering on Sky TV

The third and final programme on the World Cup is due to be transmitted this weekend as part of the SportNation series on Sky Sports. The programme should be about 15 - 17 minutes long and will mainly feature the Battersea and Leith Hill races. Dave Peel will be the expert commentator. The transmission times are as follows:

Uppsala '05

In a desperate effort to avoid the usual mind numbing tour report, I racked my brains for days to come up with the (hopefully interesting) idea of comparing Swedish events to their British counterparts. Many of you reading this may have experienced the biggest O-event in the world, the O-Ringen [biggest attendance 22,498 in 1983], but unsurprisingly an event of this size is not characteristic of your typical weekend event in Sweden. We attended four of these races on the GB summer tour to Uppsala: 2 middle, a classic and a relay.

The most striking difference in Sweden is the lack of dependence on the car; on arrival there was usually a short walk to a self-sufficient assembly area with toilets, a trader, a burger place and wait for it, showers (Swedish style showers usually involve communal nakedness on an unprecedented scale and water of varying temperature). The centre-piece of the assembly area is the run-in, used by every course and finishing within walking distance of your club tent. This is in contrast to some long walks back from the finish you can experience in this country.

Orient eering clubs in Sweden (sorry to digress) are much more central to the experience'- members are expected to wear both their club tracksuit and club Okit at all events. Whilst presumably saving a fortune on O-kit, this meant that people know who is actually in their club (I'm still trying to put names to faces of people in NOC). In the assembly area, members also congregate around their club mast thus creating a pattern of brightly coloured O-kit.

Juniors were prioritised at all the events we went to. For the youngest on string/ white they started in a separate start block much earlier than everyone else meaning they could be helped around their course by willing parents and that they were the first down the run-in. Everyone clapped for them and the fact they were the centre of attention brought smiles to their faces, fuelling their enthusiasm for more. Prizes were on offer at all events for all M/W16- and at 3 out of 4 for M/W20-. Most were simple footballs, crayons and books but I won £ 15 and 2 I KEA candle holders on my trip so I actually made a profit out of tour! I can therefore make a personal recommendation that there be a £ 100 prize (provided by NOC) for the highest NOC M20 finisher at BOC next year.

So does my waf fling have any point? Is there any way we can reasonably alter our events without increasing cost/volunteer time. The fact I cunningly left until the end is that Swedes will pay around \pounds 6 (junior) for a standard regional quality event- a significant increase on the UK. They also have a massive advantage in terms of use and quality of areas. Hope I provoked some thoughts!

Get to Know Your EMOA Committee - Mike Gardner

What is your role on the committee? EMEWS Editor —I've made everyone else provide me with their information so thought I ought to do the same.

When and how did you start orienteering? I started when I went to Sixth Form College. We had no actual sports ground available as the school was new and all around was rough open land. I would normally have played football, but that took place on somewhere called North End playing fields which I had never heard of. What has been your least favourite orienteering area / event? I just can't climb hills. Any area that is steep, and particularly where the planner seems to add legs just to add hill climb I hat e.

What other hobbies / sports do you take part in? I love travelling and so my wife and I often take holidays abroad. I like relaxing with puzzles and reading science fiction and fantasy.

Ernie's cover this month shows an actual incident he observed while controlling the Burrough Hill event. As storm clouds gathered a wonderful rainbow appeared and as he followed it down it appeared to finish at one of the controls—gold at the end of the rainbow for some competitors. When collecting the control Ernie found that the control was also gold to some of the sheep on the area as they had proceeded to nibble the control.

Out and About - Stanton Moor

Stant on Moor is one of DVO's more technical areas and a local event is due to take place there in November. It also has one of the more interesting histories of areas in the East Midlands. Geographically it lies within the boundaries of the Peak District National Park. Geologically it is situated on an island upland of millstone grit that juts into the limest one plateau from the eastern gritstone moorland, rising from the Derwent Valley still further to the east.

The moor land's history certainly dates back to the Bronze Age as the landscape of interments in ringcairns, barrows and stone circles demonstrate. It appears difficult for historians to accurately date the finds on Stanton Moor but it appears the biggest cairns are the oldest, which tends to indicate a progression during the Bronze Age. There are 70 or so barrows and ringcairns scattered across the moor. Artefacts such as urns, 'pigmy cups', beads of faience and bone, leaf-shaped and the later barbed-and-tanged arrowheads and tools of flint and stone have all been found on the moor to provide some insight in to the life of the inhabitants. While many believe these cairns are the result of druid activity, there is no evidence that druids ever visited the Stanton Moor area.

The most famous relic on the moor from this period is the Nine Ladies stone circle. There is concern over the effect the many visitors each year are having on the relics of the Moor. In 2000, the Trent & Peak Archaeological Unit undertook an excavation of the Nine Ladies stone circle for English Heritage. They claim that a survey has shown that 5 inches of soil have been eroded away from some areas of the site in just the last 12 years.



Historical records illustrate a bigger picture of change. Early sketches by Rooke (1782) and Bateman (*Vestiges*, 1848) show clearly (if not without some artistic license) that a mound of some sort existed in the centre. In the latter view a considerable bank is visible with the stones against the outside. Soon after 1882, when the stones were scheduled as an ancient monument, the circle and the King Stone were each enclosed by walls, evidently in a misguided attempt to protect the site. The walls were finally removed in 1980.

There has also been other more direct damage. Sometime in the 1990's a van backed into the King Stone and broke it off its base in the grass. It has since been pinned, but this is not the only indignity suffered by the King Stone. In the 19th century it was defaced with a deep inscription of the name "Bill Stumps". Intriguingly a mention of this has been unearthed in Chapter 11 of *The Posthumous Papers of the Pickwick Club* by Charles Dickens.

Today the graffiti remains, but the bank is hardly discernable and the walls have disappeared entirely, as has any trace of a central mound. On the plus side a *tenth* stone was uncovered, prone in the grass, apparently as a direct result of the droughts of 1976.

Stant on Hall it self dates originally from the late 16th century. Extensively rebuilt in 1693, it was extended further by Henry Bache Thornhill a century after this time, and only a small portion of the original hall can be seen today. The village itself was formed into a parish in 1876, originally part of the parish of Youlgreave nearby, and its church was erected by William Pole Thornhill in 1839. Indeed successive generations of the Thornhills were responsible for much of the building of Stanton, many of the houses dating back to the 17th and 18th century, the later mid-Victorian additions also the work of William Pole Thornhill. Indeed the initials WPT can be seen over the door ways of some cottages in the village.

The Reform Tower - a tall construction about 30 ft. high gracing the eastern edge of the Moor - was built by William Pole Thornhill to commemorate the passing of the Reform Bill in 1832. At one time it bore a plaque on its eastern face overlooking the Derwent, but this fell off and was broken and is now lost. The reform bill attempted to remove the "rotton boroughs" - constituencies that had declined in size but still had the right to elect members of the House of Commons - and to give representation to the country's fastest growing industrial towns: Manchester, Birmingham, Bradford and Leeds. There was great public support but the truth is it had little to offer to the common man as voting in the boroughs remained restricted to men who occupied homes with an annual value of £10, with similar property qualifications for people living in rural areas. The upshot was that even after the reform, one in only seven adult males had the vote. Thornhill himself would have fallen into this cat egory, and hence his Tower is rather more of a testament to his own gains, than to a real benefit for the working man,

not to mention woman. One is left wondering what *they* thought as they looked up at the hill and saw this immense folly that cast its shadow over there everyday lives.

Off the Moor proper to the southwest, rising high above the *Druid I nn* in the village of Birchover, are the enigmatic forms of **Rowt or Rocks**. The climb is about 60 ft. onto a platform that extends some 70 yards in length in a roughly east-west direction, with sheer drops, particularly along its northern edge. The outcrop is strewn with enormous weathered boulders that have been worked in numerous ways from prehistoric 'rock art' to carved 'armchairs' and deep-cut vaults. There are worn steps cut neatly where the levels change, and the whole together gives the place an elfin feel.

A stereographic image from 1860 shows an absence of the towering trees that block the visitor's sightline today in almost all directions, tantalising us to wonder at the extent of the views now lost to us, particularly through the summer months.

Recently there has been a lot of discussion about quarrying around Stanton Moor and the fact that Stancliffe Stone wish to re-open the quarries around the Moor. This has resulted in protestors living in the trees and staying on the moor for a number of years (some of us have run through their camps). It appears currently as if the protestors have won their battle. In June the High Court ruled that the quarries were dormant so that no further quarrying could take place. However, Stancliffe Stone have sought leave to appeal against the judgement at the Court of Appeal. So things may still go on for some time yet.

The OS map reference is either the car park or point from which the event will be signposted. The list is based on BOF registration, but events are sometimes cancelled.
