Editorial

The move to electronic EMEWS seemed to go fairly well. In fact I have had no comments at all from members. I am not sure if this is good or bad. I did check with a number of people that they did receive their EMEWS, and everyone seemed to have done so. Please let me know your comments and whether this does seem to be working.

One of the major decisions at the BOF AGM was the movement back to a 4 tier fixture structure (from the 3 tier structure we have been using). Hopefully this should make it easier to identify the standard of the event you are going to. It is hoped that the new structure will be implemented next year, but there are still a number of things to resolve. There are arguments for retaining the 3 tier structure, but I personally think the 4 tier structure is going to be easier to understand, especially for those folk who are not regular orienteers. The one thing I would recommend is that we don't rush the change, and communicate to all the members what is going on and why (I think this was part of the problem of moving to the 3 tier structure). So here would be my recommendations for implementing the 4 tier structure:

- 1. Communicate with all members clearly defining which type of events fit in to which level of the 4 tier structure.
- 2. Make sure that the role of all officials is clearly thought through (e.g. what level of controller can control what type of event?)
- 3. Make sure the Fixtures list clearly show the level of event so that members know what type of event they are attending.
- 4. Keep communicating the status of the change on a regular basis to all members.

EMOA Committee Meeting Report - April 19th 2010

Vacant Positions - The main role that we needed to fill was that of Treasurer. It was agreed that we should look at ways of simplifying the role, while still ensuring we were able to meet the accounting standards required for managing money from the Sports Council (such as that for the satellite club projects). Some of the things we are looking at are:

- Simplifying the accounts for the AGM and what financial standards need to be applied
- Could we move to use more electronic banking rather than all of the requirements for getting multiple signatories on larger cheques, etc,
- Ensure that members are able to quickly respond to requests from the Treasurer
- In addition we may want to consider whether the role of insurance for EMOA is still so important, particularly if the SI kit which is the largest insurance item for EMOA is now going to be distributed to clubs (see later notes).

Given these notes (and after the meeting) and that we will continue to look to simplify the role, Viv MacDonald has agreed to take over the role of EMOA Treasurer.

BOF AGM - A number of decisions were made at the BOF AGM:

- Move to 4 levels of events as opposed to the current 3 levels of event structure in 2011
- Confirmed that the differential of £2 for members at events applied to Level 1 and Level 2 events only.
- Event levies were agreed with 3 juniors equal to one senior, and no exemption for junior only events.

Midland Champs - The Midland Champs at Belvoir Castle seemed to go well. There were no major complaints at the event.

Future Events - The following future events are planned for the Region:

- 19th Sept 2010 It was agreed that the Yvette Baker Trophy round would be hosted at DVO's Carsington event.
- 24th October 2010 The Midland Middle Distance Championships are to be held at Irchester (organised by LEI). The day before the Midland Sprint Championships which will be held at the Open University campus in Milton Keynes (organised by SMOC).
- 16th November 2011 Compass Sport Cup Final Planned for Longshaw.
- 2013 East Midlands due to host British Schools Champs and clubs have been asked to consider hosting the event
- 2013 British Sprint Champs A formal bid to host these at an East Midlands
 University has been accepted. There may be an opportunity to host the British
 Middle Distance Champs on the same weekend, so clubs were asked to see if they
 wished to do that.
- 2013 Yvette Baker Trophy Final LOG are going to host this event.

Shadowing of Juniors at EM League Events - There had been some comments that for EM League Events, especially on the shorter courses, juniors were being shadowed and still counted in the League. There was also a problem that some of those shadowing were then going out and completing a course, having already been on the area. While the East Midlands committee does not want to discourage new members, especially youngsters, we need to make sure that the EM League is not won by someone being shadowed. One option was to make those being shadowed non-competitive but this was felt to be too much of a discouragement. It was therefore agreed that for EM League events:

- A note should be displayed prominently at Registration stating:
- All competitors being shadowed shall be registered as "+1" in order to show they are being shadowed, but allowing them to still be competitive in the event.
- All competitive orienteers should run first, and shadow second.

Coach of the Year Award - Catherine Hughes of NOC has been awarded the BOF Peter Palmer Coach of the Year Award.

Walsh Trophy Award - David Olivant of NOC has been awarded the Walsh Trophy 2009 for the best City/Sprint map for hi Nottingham University map used for the British Sprint Championships.

Senior Competitions Group - One thing being considered is how Relays at the JK and British Champs can be more inclusive for older competitors. What new categories would be appropriate?

Satellite Clubs Project - Six clubs are now in operation at Buxton, West Notts, Basstelaw, Derby, Chesterfield and Bramcote, and 5 coaches have been appointed. The funding for the Buxton coach is about to cease, and the clubs will need to train up their own coaches for the clubs to continue in to the future.

An assessment of the effectiveness of this approach to bringing in new members also needs t be undertaken. Is this bringing in new recruits to the sport on a long term basis? Or is this simply taking a lot of resources and when finished the new satellite clubs wither and die. This needs to be part of the assessment in to the future.

SI Kit - NOC have been successful in getting funding for additional SI kit, while DVO are still awaiting the outcome of their submission. If DVO can get their application approved then each club in the East Midlands should then have sufficient kit to host their own events, making the need for East Midlands to co-ordinate the kit no longer appropriate. There would still be a need to pool kit for some of the larger events, but we would look to then let the clubs take over their share of the kit. The clubs would also then need to take over insurance of the kit. In addition there would no longer be a need for the EMOA SI levy at events which might help clubs keep their event prices down. However, we still need to find out if DVO get their kit submission approved.

East Midlands AGM - It is currently proposed that the AGM should take place in a similar way to last year at an event, and the proposed date is the DVO Carsington event on 19th September. We will get another EMEWS out before the AGM which will provide the ability to see the agenda. Given we are sending EMEWS electronically it may be we can send a short email close to the AGM to remind members of the AGM and give them chance to have an input.

EMOA Committee Meetings - A reminder that any member can come and attend the EMOA committee meetings if they wish to do so (though they cannot vote). Next meetings will again be at Clifton Village Hall starting at 7:30pm on 21^{st} June, with a provisional date of 16^{th} August 2010 for a future meeting.



The National Forest – A National Success Story



The following is part of a press release from the Government Department on Environment, Food & Rural Affairs in March.

Fifteen years on from its inception, The National Forest is successfully delivering tangible environmental, economic and social benefits across a 200 square mile swathe of the Midlands, says the Environment Food and Rural Affairs Select Committee at the House of Commons. Lessons from this experience need to be

disseminated more widely and the government should give long term support to enable the project to deliver its full potential.

Launching the report of their short inquiry, EFRA committee chairman Rt.Hon. Michael Jack MP said, "This report highlights the opportunity for DEFRA to lead on replicating the success of The National Forest in other parts of England. It's achievements — in combining the aforestation of derelict mining sites with the creation of a new leisure industry which is both biodiverse and sustainable — are remarkable. At a challenging time for the economy the project shows just how much forest development can be the catalyst for both job creation and inward investment.

"This success has been built on commitment and skills of all The National Forest's partner organisations. Strong leadership has enabled the project to deliver significant multiple benefits to an area that had previously been in economic and environmental decline," added Mr Jack.

Nevertheless, the cross party group of MPs warns ministers that the full potential of the project will not be realised unless a more systematic approach is taken to disseminating the experience of The National Forest across England. To remedy this Defra should set out a detailed plan within the next 18 months for sharing the lessons learned by the National Forest Company more widely.

Mr Jack adds, "Growing a forest is a long term project that requires the continued engagement and enthusiasm of many local and national partners. The National Forest offers a strong model for tree planting at the kind of pace required to mitigate climate change, while balancing other environmental social and economic aims. The project deserves strong commitment from Government, including limited financial support, for many years to come."

To that end the Committee also concludes:

• The 300 hectare limit on land area that may be held by the National Forest Company (NFC) at any one time is unnecessarily restrictive and there is also scope

to make the purposes for which the NFC may acquire land more flexible. Defra should address both these matters at its next review of the NFC Financial Memorandum:

- HM Revenue and Customs and Defra should publish clear and comprehensive guidance about inheritance tax (IHT) relief available for woodland and disseminate this widely within The National Forest and beyond. They should also examine whether the IHT regime deters individuals from taking up grants or continuing participation in woodland schemes or other long - term environmentally beneficial government schemes;
- DEFRA and DECC should review the impact of the Code of Good Practice for Forest Carbon Projects within one year of its inception in order to evaluate the scope to develop tradable carbon credits for UK forestry projects;
- Priority should be given to improving public transport access to The National Forest for all segments of society.

. Key achievements of The National Forest in its first 15 years include:

Environmental:

- Planting more than 7 million trees and increasing the area's tree cover from 6% to 18%;
- Creating nearly five and a half thousand hectares of new Forest 64% of this through grants to landowners and 14% (759 hectares) through directly land acquisition; **Economic:**
- Leveraging inward investment to the Forest, including over £40 million for forest projects by the National Forest Company's partners as well as £44 million of Government grants to the company;
- · Creating or safeguarding 250 jobs in forestry and woodland businesses;
- Spurring and supporting the local tourism industry which is now worth more than £270 million and employs over 4,000 people;

Social:

- Improving access to nature for the 10 million people living within an hour's travel of the Forest and 200,000 local residents;
- Providing a range of visitor sites and facilities for leisure and recreation (e.g. Conkers, Rosliston Forestry Centre, Snibston Discovery Centre);
- Opening 85% of National Forest sites to the public: 1,731 hectares of fully open sites have been created in the last five years alone.

Anyone considering or already booked to be an event official in autumn 2010 and onwards. Organisers, planners, controllers (of all grades) or any club member who helps at orienteering events. This is part of a new modular training system for event officials and attendance at this workshop will be part of all planner / controller / organiser training in the future.

Aims of the workshop: To provide event volunteers with an overview of safety and welfare issues which may arise as a result of staging an orienteering event of any size / level. Particular attention will be paid to practical measures which event volunteers can employ to minimize risks and what to do in the event of an accident or incident occurring.

Learning Outcomes: By the end of the workshop the participants will understand how to:

- establish a safe environment for competitors, officials, spectators and members of the public
- establish good working relationships with volunteers, event helpers and other partners
- comply with the relevant rules and guidelines for the staging of orienteering events

The workshop will be led by an experienced British Orienteering tutor and there will be plenty of opportunities to share experiences and to learn from each other.

All participants will receive an attendance certificate. Attendance at this workshop will be required for future event official qualification.

Out and About - Elvaston Castle

DVO are hosting the Derbyshire Schools Championships in Elvaston Castle in June so this edition's Out and About focuses on Elvaston.

The history of the Elvaston estate can be traced back to the 11th century and earlier with ownership changing hands several times in the proceeding centuries. Records show

Sir Thomas Hanselin as one of the original estate owners before it passed into the hands of the Musards of Staveley, followed by the Frenchvilles before being purchased by Sir Walter Blount in 1420. After further changes of ownership, 1742 saw the Elvaston Stanhopes take up the title of Earl of Harrington, but the house as we know it today really started to take shape when the third Earl of Harrington, Charles Stanhope, commissioned James Wyatt to remodel the old house. Wyatt didn't live to see his plans to fruition, the designs instead being executed by Robert Walker between 1815 and 1829.

Amongst the changes designed by Wyatt were the gothic façades which still grace the house today. A new great hall was added to the west and a new wing added to the northwest. Much of the existing interior was also Wyatt's design, including the spectacular screen of four-centred arches, niches, fan vaulting and pendants in the great hall.

The fourth Earl of Harrington, Viscount Petersham, was nearly 50 when he inherited the title and estate in 1829. He had a reputation as something of a Regency buck, renowned for his stylish dress, tall and handsome looks, charming personality and way with the ladies. When he finally married in 1831, it was to Maria Foote - a Covent Garden actress seventeen years his junior. Prior to their marriage, their affair had been the talk of the town in both London and Derbyshire and their relationship had been heavily frowned upon by the previous Earl and many other members of the family.



Lord Petersham (left) and his wife took up residence at Elvaston shortly after their marriage. The couple were inseparable and besotted with one another. The Earl would never allow Maria out of the grounds - nor would he allow visitors in - such was his love and obsession for his wife. To that end, the Earl set about creating an private and secluded oasis of great beauty for himself and the love of his life - a Gothic paradise designed as a

symbol of his undying love for her. It is here that the Elvaston estate as we know it today began to take shape.

The final phase of building at the house began in 1836 when Lewis Cottingham was called in to rebuild the south front with the brief to give the facade, still the original from 1633, a more harmonious look to match the rest of the newer building work on the house. The Earl also commissioned the work on the surrounding grounds. Respected landscaper Humphrey Repton had originally been called in by the third Earl to oversee the project, but Repton turned down the commission, daunted by the unerring flatness of the estate. So, in 1830, the fourth Earl turned to previously untried gardener William Barron.

Barron spent the next 20 years working on the surrounding gardens, woodlands and pleasure grounds, introducing many revolutionary designs and techniques to the grounds including spectacular topiary, intricate drainage methods and a pioneering technique for

transporting fully-grown trees from one location to another - a method necessitated by the Earl's impatience to see his gardens in full splendor which forced Barron to bring in and plant full-grown trees for instant impressive effect rather than planting saplings. Barron's work at Elvaston established him as one of the most respected landscapes of his time and he and his successors enjoyed much prominence in the business for the next century. The gardens today, deservedly so, retain Grade II Listed status.

Following the completion of Barron's work, the estate remained shrouded in privacy as the Earl and his Countess craved their seclusion. However, following the death of the Earl in 1851, his successor, Leicester Stanhope - the Fifth Earl of Harrington - finally opened Elvaston to the public. The estate had amassed a huge reputation of the preceding years and thousands flocked to Elvaston to see the glory of the house and gardens finally revealed.

The estate remained under the ownership of the Harringtons for the remainder of the 19th century and for much of the 20th, being occupied by the Harrington's kinsmen the Lillingstons up to the onset of World War II. During the war, the house was taken over by young women and turned into a teacher training college after the original college in Derby was evacuated for safety. The college vacated the house in 1947 and it remained mostly empty for the next two decades.



With the house in a state of neglect and the grounds mostly unkempt and overgrown, the estate was finally put up for sale by the Harringtons in 1966. Derbyshire County Council and the then Derby County Borough Council were the joint purchasers. They set about a restoration project which brought much

of the grounds back to beauty (although sadly, some were beyond restoration back to their full former glory) and the estate opened to the public as a Country Park, the first of its kind in England, on Good Friday, 1970. However, by the late Nineties, the castle had fell into such disrepair that much of it was closed to the general public, reopening only on occasions for rare open days.

By 2000, Derbyshire County Council had admitted that they could no longer afford the ongoing running costs, let alone the estimated £3million repair costs to the estate. The Council therefore opened up bidding for the lease of the estate to private bidders - a process which is still dragging on with a hotel group now favourites to take over ownership, but what this would mean for access to the grounds is unclear.

Fixtures

This fixture list is intended to list all major events in the UK, and all East Midlands events. It includes all the information available to me about the event at the time of going to press. Unless otherwise stated, Local events offer entry on the day (EOD) to a range of colour coded courses with start times from 10:30 to 12:30. Some will provide a wider range of courses than others. Regional events provide colour coded within which age classes can be run. National events provide a range of age related courses and are normally entered in advance using a Standard Entry Form (SEF); entry on the day (EOD) will usually be limited and more expensive. Cheques payable to organising clubs given at beginning of details, if not specified.

The OS map reference is either the car park or point from which the event will be signposted. The list is based on BOF registration, but events are sometimes cancelled. If you are uncertain of whether an event will be on, check with the organiser. The editor takes no responsibility for wasted journeys.
