EMOA Committee Meeting Report - January 24th 2011

Treasurer's Report - Funding has come through for the Satellite Clubs which has improved the bank balance.

It was agreed to cover 50% of the cost of one LOG member to attend the UKCC Level 2 and First Aid courses as he was providing coaching for EMOA.

It was also agreed to pay the costs of one member to attend the 2011 Coaching Conference as the EMOA Coaching Representative.

EM League 2010 - The prizes will be presented for the 2010 League at Sherwood Pines.

EM League 2011 - The set of events for the 2011 EM League are listed later in EMEWS.

Future Events - The following future events are planned for the Region:

- 16th October 2011 Compass Sport Cup Final All going to plan.
- 2013 British Schools Championships DVO will host at Shipley Park
- 2013 Midland Champs will be in Sherwood Forest in January or early February. Landowner OK, date to be confirmed by Fixtures Group
- April 20th 2013 British Sprint Champs Loughborough University
- April 21st 2013 British Middle Champs DVO to run.
- 2013 Yvette Baker Trophy Final LOG are going to host this event. Details to be confirmed. Probably July time.

East Midlands Development Day - Seemed to be highly successful with around 35 attendees. Need to ensure that the names of all controllers go forward for final approval.

New Requirements - As we move to the new 4 -tier event structure all Organisers / Controllers need to have undertaken the Event Safety Training to comply with insurance requirements. This training can be done at club evenings.

In addition every single event (including Level D) will be required to have a Risk Assessment signed off by a coach or controller.

Event Rules Group - All approved 'Events' documentation relating to the new 4 Tier Event Structure effective from January 2011 (Rules, Appendices, Event Guidelines and Competition Rules) are now available for download as pdf files

at: http://www.britishorienteering.org.uk/page/events_documents. All members of British Orienteering and particularly all Club Committees and Event Officials need to be aware of this important documentation.

Map Group Report

- 1. Map registration continues for the present, BO office will provide new numbers but this process is to be replaced by the use of Event Numbers by June 2011. Map assessment has virtually ceased; assessment will be offered during the Mappers Accreditation process which is currently being developed.
- 2. Map Awards: clubs are to be asked shortly to submit maps for the 2011 Map Awards.

EMOA Committee Meetings - There is now a new format for EMOA Committee Meetings. Members of the committee will attend a short business meeting at 7:30pm, then after that the meeting will focus on a key topic from 8:00pm onwards. All members are invited to these sessions. The next meeting is at Clifton Village Hall on 28th March in 2011. The topic covered following the business meeting will be the development plan. We welcome all members to come and get involved. The development plan is attached below:

Note to EM Clubs re EMOA's priorities and funding – December 2010

At its meeting on 29 November, EMOA considered its future priorities and funding and agreed to consult the EM clubs for their comments.

This paper sets out the issues and EMOA would like comments by mid March 2011, so that they can be considered at the EMOA Committee meeting on 28 March 2011.

The constitution of EMOA states that the Association's objectives "shall be to co-ordinate and develop the sport of orienteering, as defined by the British Orienteering Federation, within the East Midlands, and so to further the development of and participation in the sport of orienteering."

If we take each of these 3 points in turn:

a) Co-ordination of orienteering – this is done largely through the EMOA Fixtures Secretary. The EMOA Committee consider this should continue as it is currently done – it incurs no specific costs.

To an extent it also happens with the East Midlands league though this could be developed further (see below).

b) Development of orienteering – there are four areas here where the Committee thinks EMOA has a role.

<u>Junior development</u> – a priority is the development of the junior squad. Clubs should be responsible for the development of juniors to a certain level of competence and then the Region should concentrate on developing the more talented orienteers. The squad could be encouraged to organise/plan and run one event per year, around the four clubs, to develop these skills as well as to raise their awareness of the roles involved in putting on events. They could keep the income from this. There is £1500 in the budget for the junior squad.

<u>Volunteer development</u> – the drive to develop organisers, planners and controllers should come from the clubs but EMOA could continue to arrange and fund the development days (with any funding which may be available from BOF) as this is more cost effective and the networking between clubs is very beneficial. It also ensures we comply with BOF standards eg Event Safety, accreditation.

<u>Coaches</u> – again the drive to encourage these should come from the clubs, so that they can develop juniors to a sufficient level to go into the Regional squad and to develop novice and other adults.

<u>Event development</u> – EMOA should give more focus to event development eg feedback on major events and where we can learn from these. Taking forward new initiatives may be best done at a regional level eg new techniques in mapping. There is also scope for Controllers to work across Clubs at Level C events both within EMOA and in other regions such as WMOA and YHOA.

c) Increasing participation – EMOA should focus on developing and supporting regional based events such as an individual and club based East Midlands league and/or an urban league. In terms of costs, there is no specific budget for this. (The satellite club project has been funded through a Sport England grant and one option is to raise more money this way.)

Income and expenditure

In the future EMOA will need to have sufficient funds available to be able to provide training sessions/workshops for members of Clubs in the East Midlands without any expectation of financial support from British Orienteering in case grants etc. from Sport England and other funding bodies are reduced or cease altogether.

EMOA's current income covers its activities. However, if EMOA wants to expand on these it can use its reserves in the short to medium term to do so. However, in the future EMOA may wish to raise more money through grants, levies or membership, to increase its development activities. There are three main ways of doing this:

Raise the levy – pros: those who do more orienteering pay more and funds come in from orienteers outside the region. Cons: clubs will not see a direct financial benefit, so supporting the priorities will hit them harder. Also if something like Foot and Mouth occurred, no money would come in and junior development might stop. Currently the levy fee of 40p for a senior at an event costing £7 represents 6% of the total cost. A rise to 50p would raise this to 7% but bring in an additional £360 based on last year's figures.

Raise the membership fee – pros: EMOA members would pay for EMOA benefits. Cons: it may be less obvious to members what value they are getting for their very visible financial contribution.

<u>Charge clubs pro rata</u> – pros: clubs meet the direct cost of their members engaging in EMOA activities. Cons: clubs may have different priorities, making some activities not viable.

Note – apart from EMOA (we charge £3 for seniors), only three other Associations charge a fee – NIOA - £13.50; SOA - £9 and SWOA - £5. But many clubs charge significantly higher club fees eg SYO - £10; WCH - £10.25; HOC - £12.50; AIRE - £15.00

EMOA Committee's view is that the levy should be retained as it is a small percentage of the entry fee for an event and is based on the "user pays" principle. It provides a relatively stable income to EMOA, at a time when the future of the Forestry Commission and other landowners' charging proposals are unknown and the future of Sport England funding to BOF is unclear. It is probably better to make no change rather than making a change and having to reverse it if circumstances were to change.

EMEWS

Is it necessary to continue with EMEWS, as most of the information can be found or could be included on websites? An alternative might be to produce a bi-monthly email for all members, with short snappy bits of news and referring them to websites. This would remove the considerable job required of the EMEWS editor, lose us £100 in advertising from Ultrasport and require coordination. It could be sent to Club secretaries for distribution. What are the Clubs' views on EMEWS; which sections do people read and want to keep? There is little cost involved as it is now (mostly) sent out electronically.

EMOA Committee - 29 November 2010

Discussion on Junior Development at January 24th Meeting

The new approach to committee meetings means that one subject is discussed in an open framework after a short business meeting. All members are welcome to attend these sessions, the first session concentrated on Junior Development. The following are some notes from that discussion:

There needs to be more transparency for the Junior Development in the Region. Almost 90% of EMOA funds are spent on Junior Development and members need to see how and why this money is spent. Need to provide more on what the Junior Squad does, and the criteria for being able to join it. This will be made available on the EMOA website.

There should also be more visibility of the programme of squad activities. The current list is provided below (see separate article):

It is hoped to provide more articles (such as reports on training activities) and images on the junior squad in EMEWS and on the EMOA website. There will also be a place on the EM Committee Agenda to regularly report on the Junior Squad.

The Junior Squad may look at developing 2 levels of membership. The higher level would take part in Regional Coaching, the lower level would get predominantly Club Coaching but get invites to some Regional activities,

The development of coaches is the responsibility of Clubs and the Association. We need more coaches to progress from level 1 to level 2. There needs to be more integration with the Club Coaches and Regional activities.

It would be good if clubs can consider putting on various types / disciplines of events as well as standard classic events. This might better prepare juniors for some competitions (e.g. British School Score Champs). It would also be good if we can find ways to integrate different types of event in to the EM League.

In the past the Junior Squad had organised / planned one event per year. It might be worth considering this again (to get juniors involved in this side of things, get people to recognise the junior squad, but also to help fund the Squad). However, this might mean reduction in income for a club so this would need some further consideration.

It was recommended that the group that produced the Development Paper should review the paper in the light of this discussion and see if anything can be fed in to the next EM Committee meeting when the Development Plan is to be discussed.

Future Committee Meetings and Topics - The next meeting after March 28^{th} (see above) will be on June 6^{th} and will look at the Finances and Constitution of the Association and plan for the 2011 AGM.



East Midlands Junior Orienteering Squad

Our latest training (29th/30th January 2011) saw the squad travel the short distance to the West Midlands and Cannock Chase with two days spent training on Beaudesert. The 20 strong group of Juniors were joined by the West Midlands and Welsh Junior Squads to practice rough compass, contours and speed control in a variety of terrain including low visibility, pitted areas, intricately contour former mine workings and fast open forest. Evening activities at Brocton Village Hall, which provided the overnight accommodation included strength and conditioning and a presentation about selection races for the coming season as well as the normal games and socialising. Sunday was spent on Beaudesert south with exercises including route choice, simplification and more contours work and we were again joined by the Welsh Junior Squad. The day was finished with an odds and evens fun relay with around 12 teams from the Welsh and East Midlands Junior teams. A close race was fort with an East Midlands team of Harriet Lawson (DVO), Samuel Horsewill (NOC) and Simon West (LEI) coming out on top despite visiting an extra control. A number of teams finished within the next minute or so. A special mention for the young team of Kieran Huggan (NOC, M16), Euan Tebbut (LEI, M14) and Charlotte Webster (W14, NOC) who only finished around a minute behind the winners showing a bright future for the East Midlands Team.

National Forest and Other Things!! - report from Roy Denney

The December meeting of the National Forest Access & Recreation Working Group was held belatedly due to the snow. It was a lively and lengthy meeting and discussed a lot of items that may affect us. Many attendees are from local government, government agencies and departments, QUANGOs or similar bodies and so conversations obviously revolved around the government cutbacks and their impact. Roy also attended other meetings and some of the comments come from those other meetings as well.

At this stage many of the bodies see the Government cutbacks as disastrous, but no-one has a complete picture of the impact at this stage.

However, many of the cuts being publicised will have an impact on our sport.

Many authorities are taking rights of way and country parks as soft targets and we are seeing draconian cuts such that it is doubtful they will be even able to handle their statutory responsibilities. There may however be a get out of jail card on the horizon for them as the Public Bodies Bill being processed will remove many of these liabilities. This may help them but do nothing to help the likes of ourselves. Whatever your politics and whoever you feel got us into this mess, it is going to hurt.

Amongst other matters being addressed by the Bill, British Waterways is going to shrink back to being a government department just owning the waterways and being legally responsible for its statutory obligations and the actual management of the system will probably go out to tender with one or more new and existing trusts being encouraged to get involved. This is bound to have some impact on rights of access etc.

Another hot potato is the sale of Forestry Committee woodlands. Initially the percentage they had been asked to put on the market was thought manageable, as they have numerous scattered tiny blocks of little use to anybody. However it then came to light that these are the hard to get at and manage bits and were often pockets of ancient woodland necessary for the government to maintain its biodiversity targets so they have now directed the FC to sell off other and larger blocks to achieve the target. Ideally these would be the boring blocks of commercial coniferous woodland but as these provide the FC with their only income stream it will be the nice broadleaved runnable woodlands that are under most threat. A side issue which you are all to well aware of is the increased access fees being introduced as part of the same funding crises. Perhaps the one saving grace for the woodlands is that the FC did dedicate all its freehold ownings under the CROW act and as such all access rights transfer with any change of ownership but a new owner could charge organised groups as much as he felt that the market would bear. This is of course assuming the coalition do not legislate to remove these rights which does at present seem unlikely. The FC have been told to generate £100 Million of returns for the taxpayer (government) and to sell off 15% of their holdings

A similar issue arises out of Ministry of Defence Land. They have also been told to sell off land some of which we enjoy access to. Not only that but rights of way which used to cross such land were formally closed to create these bases and unless they are reinstated by legal

action before the sale off they may be lost for ever. Some are in fact defunct anyway but many are regularly being used since bases became derelict or mothballed. Such access was

officially stopped off by alternative legislative processes and under some a case can be made for automatic restoration if an application is made but many do not have that protection. Certainly a lot of the woodlands LOG use on or about former aerodromes must be a worry for the future. Cottesmore in LEI country appears safe at the moment as although the RAF base is being closed it is likely that army units returning from Germany may be housed there. We do not in any event orienteer there but

it is alongside areas we do use and the wooded parts of the site have always been an ambition for extending areas.

Many authorities are cutting 50% and more of the staff working for the departments dealing with access lands etc. Nottingham are to shed half their rights of way team for an example. Leicestershire have made no final decisions but the already lean RofW team should not be

Scheme. This means that as the 10 year schemes come to an end they will not be renewed and no new grants will be provided for access. These permissive schemes often provide routes to and from woodland area otherwise not well served by rights of way and again might adversely affect the sport.

Natural England East Midlands team involved in the aspect of their affairs which affects us has now been reduced to one man and further restructuring is afoot which will do away completely with any regional or geographic based teams. The FC in the East Mids is to lose 25% of its foresters. The National Forest is safe and the concept bought into by the new government and they are celebrating (if that is the right term) only being given a 19% budget cut over 4 years. They are to reduce the number of board members by 1 and other staff will not be replaced as they leave. The surviving officers will have wider briefs and the risk is of course that they may be asked to cover areas outside their real areas of knowledge. In addition they will soon be rattling round in the shiny big office and changes may have to happen there.

All is not bad news however. The work of the National Forest project continues and there are several developments on the pipeline which may be very interesting for us. Some developments of interest are in Staffordshire and we can only hope that West Mids take them up. On our own patch some of the schemes being advanced are in South Derbyshire, one is I think straddling the border but the rest are in Leicestershire.

There is a 50 acre scheme going in by Overseal (Seal Lodge - Gunby) an area with numerous small schemes and pockets of existing woodland many of which it may be practical to link together.

There is a scheme at Derby Hill House Farm which is only modest in size but is just off the

side of Staunton Harold Reservoir giving a pocket of woodland off the path round the reservoir and possibly creating a circuit which could be used in conjunction with other areas. There is a large new woodland being created near Stanton By Bridge which whilst owned by the National Forest itself will be managed by the Forestry Commission. The downside of this is that as part of the arrangements, FC were to acquire the freehold of the adjoining Robins Wood to improve access there but that purchase has been squashed under the 'cuts' and that wood will still be restricted by the present leasehold arrangements.

By Conkers itself a new scheme of 50 acres is going in (Boothorpe?) which is alongside an existing smaller tender scheme but together will create a useable block which more importantly is linkable to a much larger area already being surveyed and mapped by LEI. There is another big acquisition by Normanton Le Heath again alongside an existing smaller scheme which will also create a useable block.



There is as 40 acre plot to be developed at Ravenstone which whilst not directly linked to Sence Valley may be able to be used in conjunction with it. There is a scheme going in at Botcheston Golf Course adjoining Ratby Woodlands and this involves more and better access to the golf course area. There is a 15 acre scheme going in at Swithland Wood Farm alongside Swithland Woods and a fairly sizeable block at Thors Wood, Swepstone again near other areas which LEI have had their eyes on.

LEI have had to switch an event which was to have been at Willesley due to major works



being carried out there. These are due to finish by Easter and the new restaurant, visitor centre, cycle hire and dedicated cycling circuits will then be opened. The tenders are coming in as we speak to run this operation which will include a conference room which should be an ideal base for future events.

One last point coming out of our meeting: The proposed long distance trail route has now been agreed and is being surveyed. When it can actually be launched is money dependent but it is to be 72 miles long snaking from Beacon Hill to the west of the forest.

East Midlands League - 2010

The 2010 East Midlands League completed at the Outwoods in December. We did lose some events at the end of the year.

As we now have 16 events we will continue to have 8 events scoring.

Forestry Commission Sell Off

The following was provided by the Forestry Commission who are looking to prevent the sell off of much of the woodland

What does the Forestry Commission do?

The Forestry Commission

- manages over half a million acres of land in England and has been independently assessed as the world leader in sustainable forest management.
- provides public access for walking, cycling, horseriding and much more as well as, holiday cabins and campsites.
- > is the UK's largest producer of timber.
- Manages a significant number of internationally important conservation sites.

All this costs each tax payer just 30p per year - fantastic value for money

The Forestry Commission receives £9 million each year from the government to manage over half a million acres of land. In comparison, the 750 acre Hampstead Heath in London costs the tax payer £6 million per year and the Royal Parks of London which amount to 5,000 acres get a massive £20 million of tax payers money.

The government says that selling off woodlands will improve efficiency and reduce public spending. This isn't true...

- It plans to raise £100 million by selling your public woodlands, in the guise of reducing public debt, but at the same time the government has promised to invest £100 million in overseas forestry.
- Meanwhile, if woodlands are sold to private owners, the result will be an increased cost to the tax payer and less public benefits.
- Private woodland owners could claim government grants of up to 3 times the amount that it costs to run the Forestry Commission, and they are not obliged to provide the same benefits.
- > The government is planning to sell off your woodlands and has no plans to consult you about this

It has already ignored the 2009 public consultation, which showed strong public support for national ownership of forests and the benefits they provide.

These proposals will rob the public of more than half a million acres of forest and will put the proceeds into the pockets of the rich -

Robin Hood wouldn't have let this happen! Why should we?

We need to stop these plans. National treasures like Sherwood Forest and other local woodlands could be sold off. Once they are gone, they will be lost forever.

UK Masters Cup - 2011 Operation

Introduction

The proposal is to provide a competition for veteran/masters (M/W35+) orienteers based on a subset of the current programme of Level A and some Level B events.

2011 will be a trial year with the intention of providing a finals event in the future.

Principles of the UK Masters Cup

The principles of the UK Masters Cup (UKMC) are similar to those of the UK Cup:

- Encourage greater quality competition.
- Use a simple position based scoring system (rather than the national rankings).
- Encourage participation in more events.
- Provide as much variety in terrain type and geographical locations as possible
- Promote alternative competition formats.
- Provide a competition that is recognised and respected.
- Provide competition over a ten-month period (January to October)

Classes

The competition will be based on the five-year age groups for men and women from M/W35. Where events included in the UK Masters' Cup use a different class structure, e.g. urban events, classes will be disaggregated for the purpose of the UKMC scoring. In order to be competitive runners must run the designated course for their age class (Long if both Long & Short classes are offered). For events based on colour coded courses organisers will need to state the UKMC age class to course designation in the event pre-entry details.

Results Co-ordinator

Eddie Harwood has agreed to coordinate the results of the competition.

Competition Rules

- 1. All competitors must be M/W35+ and current National or Local Members of British Orienteering to score in the UK Masters Cup. (Competitors should note that this does not remove the requirement to be a National Member of British Orienteering in order to enter the British Championships Long, Middle, Sprint and Night.)
- 2. Competitors may run in any five-year age class for which they are eligible i.e. they may run up into a younger age class. Where age classes are combined at an event they will be awarded points in the oldest age class for which they are eligible unless they email Eddie Harwood in advance eddie@go-plus.net. If a competitor runs in more than one age class during the year, the points obtained in different age classes will not be combined: separate cumulative points totals will appear in each of the age classes in which the competitor has run. Men can only score in M classes and women in W classes.
- 3. Points will be allocated as follows: 1st place 60 points, 2nd 55, 3rd 51, 4th 48, 5th 46, 6th 45, 7th 44 and then by one point decrements as far as 50th place 1 point.
- 4. Overall scores will be the best 8 from the 19 designated events.
- 5. In the event of an equal placing in an individual event points will be divided between the competitors e.g. if two competitors are in equal first place they will receive 57.5 points each.
- 6. If two or more competitors are tied in first place in the final overall UK Masters Cup placings a countback system will be applied using the number of first places, followed by second places, etc. until a split between their placings is achieved, however many events it takes to achieve this. Other tied placings will remain unchanged.
- 7. The competition coordinator (Ranald Macdonald r.f.macdonald@btinternet.com) and results coordinator (Eddie Harwood) will make decisions on issues not covered by these rules. Their decisions will be final. Competitors should not contact event organisers about issues relating to the UK Masters Cup.
